18th Annual Spring Frolic Recap

Spring has sprung at the Barberville Pioneer Settlement and community members flocked to mark the occasion at the 18th Annual Spring Frolic.



Chances to watch and learn hands-on skills were abundant during Spring Frolic. Weaving demonstrations, as well as spinning, wagon wheel making, rope making, wood carving, basket making, chair caning, broom making, blacksmithing and pottery. Visitors gathered around to witness history come alive as these talented demonstrators put on a show with traditional techniques.

Many spent the day on the hunt for the 12 wooden fiddles hidden around the 20 historic buildings for the chance to win a prize. Some diligent fiddle hunters even found them all.

Over 250 Musician filled the air with feel-good melodies, some visitors sat and enjoyed the music while others couldn't help but get up and dance along. Storytellers drew in huge crowds and took listeners on journeys through the past. The

Jam Tents were packed and altered between different styles of music throughout the day. Anyone who was inspired to get musical themselves was able to attend one of the several music workshops. Visitors had the chance to learn a variety of skills, from fiddle-playing to songwriting to the musical saw.

Nobody went hungry at the Spring Frolic. The dessert kitchen was filled with delicious homemade treats and coffee, vendors offered an array of delicious snacks and drinks, and the Barberville Summer Kitchen had countless repeat customers raving about the made-from-scratch, hickory-smoked pulled pork sandwiches.

A Car-lover's paradise was the open house in Herman's Garage. The Antique & Vintage Car Show boasted 60 Model A's along with several antique tractors and engines. For antique fans, another great stop was the Pierson Railroad Depot where there were demonstrations on Telegraph Operation, and the Firehouse, where antique engines and fire-fighting equipment were on display.

For those who wanted the chance to bring a piece of history home, the silent auction was the place to be. Visitors bid on antique items in hopes of winning a unique treasure to remember their exciting day at the Spring Frolic.

Idella's Crisp Biscuits

Idella Parker worked as a maid to the author Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings. Rawlings is famous for her widely known book, *The Yearling* published in 1938. This recipe comes from the *Cross Creek Cookery* historical cookbook first published in 1942. Idella Parker went on to write two books of her own after working for Rawlings, but made her first appearance in publication in *The Cross Creek Cookery*. Her recipe for "Idella's Biscuits" appears in the book.

2 cups flour

4 teaspoons baking powder

3/4 teaspoon salt

6 tablespoons butter

3/4 cup milk



The instructions prompt the baker to "mix as usual, using a fork throughout. Roll out once, to a thickness of one-quarter inch. Cut in very small rounds, one inch in diameter. Bake twelve or fifteen minutes in a very hot oven."

The vague directions like "hot" oven rather than an exact temperature may be difficult for bakers today to follow, but it's characteristic of pioneer cooking. Barbara Swell writes in her book *Log Cabin Cooking* about the experience of pioneer cooking, calling the method most used in the pioneer's day "Make-Do Cooking". The basic point of make-do cooking was to focus on instinct and trial and error to successfully cook due to the lack of exact measurements of uniformity in cooking supplies. Pioneer's couldn't have simply set their oven to 450 degrees Fahrenheit.

This recipe might seem unexciting, but it is characteristic of the simple use of ingredients by the Florida pioneers. This recipe was described by Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings as "crisp as shortbread" not a flaky biscuit recipe, in a true Southern fashion.

In *Cross Creek Cookery*, Rawlings tells a story about a Northerner who came to visit her. Rawlings would prepare a biscuit before telling a long story. As the tourist went to eat the biscuit, the hostess would insist on replacing his biscuit with a hot one, and this cycle continues so that he never eats one of the biscuits. This somewhat odd story seems to highlight the joy of eating a biscuit when it's perfectly warm.

If you're curious to create the recipe for yourself, there are guides and videos to follow online, showing that the tried and true method of making Idella's Biscuits still holds up, head over to YouTube and try it for yourself!

Bettina Maraldo

Bettina Maraldo had been a frequent & stalwart volunteer at the Settlement for over three decades. She was a matron in both the Fiber Guild & The Rug Hookers. A skilled hooked rug artist herself, Bettina organized several antique hooked rug exhibitions for the Settlement. In recognition of her dedicated service to the Settlement, Bettina received the Lura Bell award and a Lifetime Membership. Before moving to Florida, Bettina was

a demonstrator at the famous Brandywine-Wyeth Museum in Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania. She was well loved by Settlement

staff, volunteers, and guests alike.

John L. Alison was a talented guitarist and teacher. John volunteered with the program Guitar 4 Vets, a national program that provides veterans with free guitars and guitar lessons. John—an army vet himself—participated in Guitar 4 Vets by teaching vets suffering from PTSD how to play the guitar. John spoke of music the same way a spouse speaks of love. He once said of teaching music, "I depend on it for my daily sanity and at the same time it keeps me centered. To give someone the gift of music is one of the best things you can do for someone." John was a frequent volunteer musician at the Settlement. Not just during the Frolic and Jamboree, but also during 1st Saturday Music Workshops and Playing on the Porches. Everyone who met him was moved by his smile and gentleness.
