From the Director's Desk

What's Forty Years? While Steve Jobs and Steve Wozniak were churning out the first Apple computers at Jobs' parents' house in Los Altos, California—forty years ago—Lura Bell and several other visionaries were busy making plans to establish an Arts Center and to save an abandoned, dilapidated school in Barberville, Florida.

The dream grew and the groundwork escalated after Lura Bell, the tenacious art teacher and a small group of her friends gained access to the vacated property. The first of many letters to the Superintendent of Volusia County Schools, Dr. Donald G. Gill asking for support of the concept, was authored by Lura Bell on September 23, 1975.

Eleven months later, on August 20, 1976 the first official Board Meeting to establish the non-profit organization was held at the Howard Johnson's on US 92 in Deland. The Articles of Incorporation were signed and notarized and the organization was born. By December of 1976 Volusia County Schools had approved a 25-year lease agreement which launched a successful 31 year cooperative partnership between the two organizations.

Lura Bell continued tenaciously to petition the Volusia County School Board to provide additional support by having them fund two full time positions to augment the growing educational field trip programs. Her efforts succeeded. Lura became the first full time Director/Teacher on Assignment and eventually was able to add a full time clerical person. Another benefit of being an adjunct classroom of the Volusia County School District was that the Settlement was entitled to the use of equipment, furniture, printing facilities and instructional support. In addition for many years the School District funded field trips to the Settlement for all of Volusia County second grade students.

Sadly Lura Bell's health began to decline. In 1986, Mrs. Marilyn Breeze was chosen to carry on as the second Director/ Teacher on Assignment. Marilyn served as the Pioneer Settlement's Director for the next twenty years.

During the 1980's and 90's an important transition began to occur. The Pioneer Settlement began acquiring and moving local and regional historically significant buildings onto the property. This transition enhanced the historical value of the property. What started out to be an Art Center has emerged into what you see today, a historical village museum with the mission to educate and entrust the public and future generations with knowledge of the pioneer lifestyle of our forefathers, through hands on experience, folk life demonstrations, preservation and historical exhibits.

During the early years a huge volunteer staff was developed to aid the needs created by field trips, special events like the Fall and Spring Country Jamborees and other activities. Supporters from all walks of life and trades offered help build and move to structures. Community support was also provided through financial donations, membership dues. sales in the Commissary Store and the Bridge House Gallery and food sales from the



summer kitchen. Many of these special activities that were created forty years ago are still in place today and are significant to our financial well-being.

When the lease expired in 2001, ownership of the property was bestowed from the Volusia County School District to the Board of Directors of the Pioneer Settlement for the amount of one dollar and the stipulation that the property remain in use for educational purposes.

The effects of the Great Recession of 2007—09 had a great toll on the Pioneer Settlement. Due to financial cut backs the Volusia County School District had to withdraw all of its financial support. That combined with other surrounding schools ceasing travel for field trips and a decline in donations, memberships, and admission, the Pioneer Settlement like many other organizations and businesses during that time went into "survival mode".

Little do people realize that the existence of this organization today is owed in a large part to the persistence of a few fundamental staff members and a handful of passionate volunteers and supporters. Had it not been for their efforts, one of the region's most valuable historic resources could have become depressed beyond repair or even extinct. What a shame that would have been!

Even now we continue to recover from those years of being in a survival mode. Our aged buildings and infrastructure are in constant need of repair and maintenance. The abundance of educational volunteers that once existed has progressively dwindled and they have become increasingly difficult to replace. Positions where we once could rely on volunteers we now must fill with paid staff. It has become essential for us, like many non-profit organizations to think and operate more like a business.

We have a couple of typically slow months ahead. Last summer we got by with only four staff members. This summer in order to cover the field trips already scheduled in July we have increased to seven staff members this year. Just the other day we had 150 students and fifteen walk-ins, the like of which has not happened on a hot July day in many years.

Our vision to be known as the area's premier living history destination is attainable. We are expanding our marketing efforts to include a focus on tourism. We are working on building relationships with more community partners. We are researching ways to develop new revenue sources, to generate repeat donors and visitors, to grow membership, increase attendance and expand our events.

As we enter into this next phase of growth

your continued support is crucial. There are many projects that are outside the scope of our annual operating budget that require extensive repairs/restoration. Most government grants available for restoration projects nowadays require matching funds. Considerable fund raising will need to be done in the future to continue to preserve and save the Underhill House, the Turpentine Still and the Pastime Boat.

The good news is now that the phase one at the Underhill House is complete we are planning to have the roof of the Astor Bridge Tender's House replaced in the very near future. Thanks to all of you that contributed to this campaign! It took over a five year period but current funds for this project have reached \$24,322.00.

So... What is forty years? After delving into forty years' worth of Board Meeting minutes and other documents, I can tell you this... First and foremost it's the people. Forty years-worth of people from all walks of life, some that are still with us and many that are not, some that stayed a short time and others a lifetime. Passionate, persistent and patient people, each providing an



individually unique contribution to the Pioneer Settlement's history thereby leaving an everlasting mark on our future. It's for these immeasurable people that we salute the success of forty years!

Although we have not had quite the fame and fortune comparable to that of Apple Computers, we are still going to celebrate our fortieth in a really big way! We are giving away \$4,000 and as you will see throughout these next pages there are many fun opportunities for you to join and support us! I look forward to seeing you here in Barberville real soon!


