> Barberville and our ongoing efforts to promote history and education in Florida.





Saving the Joseph Underhill House

The crew from A. G. Pifer Construction Company began work at the end of November and have been working diligently on the Joseph Underhill House ever since. The stabilization of this 137 year old house has been absolutely amazing to watch and document. Many thanks goes out to Gregg Pifer for sending us his best crew and for all of the extras that they have provided along the way! Also thanks to the Volusia County ECHO Grant program without whose support this project would not be happening.

Originally the home had only an outside stairway to the second floor. Through the years an indoor stairway was added in the main hallway. In doing so about 4 feet of a major support beam had been severed and removed. A replacement beam was donated to the Settlement in February 2015 by Jeff Grezelak of Orlando. Jeff delivered the beam and with the help of a few volunteers they unloaded it onto the porch to dry, until the time came for it to be installed.











All six of the 20 foot front porch support columns were replaced. The columns were delivered and hand-mortised on site by Dan Cardin.

The rear porch supports were replaced. The porch floor had to be raised-up about 5 inches on one side to be level. New floor boards and steps were installed.





Rather than go through the expense of removing the cement front porch we opted to mask it with wood and lattice to resemble the original wooden porch.

Throughout the years the support piers had been patched in with anything that would fit including a couple of car jacks.

The 1930's addition which had connected the house to the original summer kitchen and enclosed the original well underwent selective demolition. The summer kitchen has been boarded up and restoration efforts for it will be part of a future phase.



A doorway that had been cut out from one of the first floor rooms to access the rear is being bricked back in. Bricks are also being replaced on the second floor where the stairway opened up. The cement blocks you see in the photos are being used to fill the interior portion of the wall since the amount of exact matching bricks are limited. Some bricks were donated by Mark

Shuttleworth of Florida Victorian and our friend Bill Crippen.







The stairs to the second floor are once again located on the back porch!
