# We Survived the Pandemic—And Never Has Normal Looked so Nice.

COVID-19 hit us hard! "Us' being the Settlement, the state of Florida, the nation, and the world. 601k deaths In America—and over 37k here in FL—, to say we survived the pandemic is to count our blessings. But COVID has affected us in more ways than just the virus itself. Shutdowns and quarantines have weakened our economic immune systems. We see it in empty grocery store shelves, in rising consumer prices, and in shuttered small businesses. Small independent museums, like us, suffered too. All the school districts in the region canceled field trips last year (Can you imagine your childhood and going an entire grade level without a single field trip?!). 2020 saw our youth admissions drop from around 11,000 to around 1000!

Also, we had to cancel, postpone, or scale-back a lot of our jocund, fund-raising festivals and events. And some of those that we were able to launch, Mother Nature was less than cooperative. The 2020 Spring Frolic was scratched completely. The 44<sup>th</sup> annual Fall Country Jamboree was postponed and became our inaugural January Jamboree in 2021. And while the January Jamboree was successful (and a lot of fun if we do say so ourselves), the frigid temperatures of January were considerably colder than autumnal November and that was reflected in the attendance.

The 2021 Spring Frolic, too, was not without weather complications. Saturday started out clement and delightful. However, by the afternoon a nasty piece of weather moved in and sat on top of us until late

Sunday. It dumped something like 3 inches of rain in 24 hours.


We canceled Sunday entirely due to this monsoon-level rain event.

## **Pioneer Settlement Goes to the Movies**

Did you know that the Barberville Pioneer Settlement is a movie star? But don't worry; we won't go all Hollywood on y'all. Many filmmakers over the years have fallen in love with the Settlement and used it as a setting in their movies and projects. Here are a few of them for your binge-watching pleasure:

Last year, in 2020, Jon Anderson, Rachel Wright, Oliver Peters, and Joseph Stone won two Emmys for their documentary, *W.A.S.P. :A Wartime Experiment in Wo-men Power.* Their documentary was partially filmed in the Barberville Central High School. Even more recently—back in March— 14-year-old filmmaker, Candido Soto III, shot his short film, *Axe Soup*, at the Lewis cabin. *Axe Soup* was nominated for two categories in June at the 2021 Orlando Independent Filmmakers Escape Challenge, including Best Original Story. Hopefully, we will be able to host a screening of Candido's film once it is released to theaters.

In 2015, the biopic film on Walt Disney, *Walt Before Mickey*, was partially filmed here at the schoolhouse. And the 1989 Brooke Shields and Timothy Dalton action/adventure movie, *Brenda Starr*, used our tour boat, *The Pastime*, as a vehicle prop (prior to the Settlement's acquisition and dry docking of her).

The Barberville Pioneer Settlement does not limit itself to the Silver Screen. We also have been featured on the small screen. Parents of toddlers and young children will most likely be familiar with *Blippi*! Back in February, Blippi and his crew shot all over the Settlement for their YouTube program.
